WHEREAS, certain abatement of public nuisance proceedings have been initiated by the City of Mount Holly pertaining to a certain lot or parcel located in the City of Mount Holly, North Carolina, and identified as Tax Parcel ID# 124316, 103 Webb Street, said parcel being owned by Regina Hampton; and,

WHEREAS, notice of violation was made known to the above-mentioned owner as required by Section 8-9 through 8-14 of the Ordinances of the City of Mount Holly, North Carolina, and the owner has failed to abate the nuisance and the administrator has caused the property to be cleared of the nuisance; and,

WHEREAS, that the actual cost of abated the nuisance has not been paid within 30 days after receipt of the statement of the charges from the City.

Dear Mayor Hough and City Council:

On behalf of Decoding Dyslexia North Carolina, I am requesting that you proclaim October as "Dyslexia Awareness Month" in Mount Holly, for 2015. I am also sending this letter to other Gaston County cities and towns in the hopes they will join you and Charlotte Mayor Clodfelter.

I am a resident of Lowell and work for the City of Charlotte. I have been a resident of Gaston County for most my life. I have a son, who is in the 4th grade at Lowell Elementary. He was diagnosed with dyslexia this summer, but was evaluated by the school in 2nd grade with a specific learning disability in reading. Yet, despite his normal IQ, he is reading at a 1st grade level even though he has received the standard reading interventions that Gaston County schools provide since the second half of kindergarten.

I am considering becoming Parent Support Coordinator in Gaston County for Decoding Dyslexia North Carolina to help parents in Gaston County that are facing a similar situation. Decoding Dyslexia North Carolina (DDNC) is a grassroots movement driven by North Carolinians concerned with the limited access to educational interventions for dyslexia. DDNC is made up of individuals & parents who are interested in sharing their experiences of the journey with dyslexia and bringing about change in legislation concerning this learning disability. One of our main goals is to raise awareness for dyslexia. You will help us raise dyslexia awareness by proclaiming October as "Dyslexia Awareness Month."

We recommend the following clauses for a proclamation to declare October as "Dyslexia Awareness Month" in Mount Holly for 2015:

Whereas, dyslexia is a language-based learning disability, that affects approximately one in five people, regardless of race, gender, age, or socioeconomic status; and

Whereas, neurological in origin, dyslexia affects the way the brain processes information, and is characterized by difficulties with reading, writing and spelling despite normal intelligence; and

Whereas, those with dyslexia benefit greatly from specialized assistance from highly trained teachers, multi-sensory learning programs and individualized instruction; and

Whereas, early identification, alternative instruction and extra support from friends, family and teachers can contribute to the success dyslexic students enjoy in the classroom, in life and, later on, in employment.

If proclaimed, this proclamation should be mailed to Jennifer McBee at the address above. This proclamation is needed by October 1, 2015.

Ms. Lilly advised that truck traffic has progressively gotten worse since she moved to her residence on North Main. Furthermore she spoke about rerouting the truck traffic around Highway 16.

Mr. Schick came before the City Council to introduce himself. He advised that he moved to Mount Holly 8 years ago and is speaking up today to applaud the City Council and Staff for making a difference in the community.

Steve Conder

Mr. Conder commented that truck traffic on Highway 273 has become a real problem. He advised the trucks shake his house when they come by and a few years ago a truck traveling by his property lost a tire and it came through his privacy fence and came within feet of hitting his daughter that was playing inside the fence. He further advised that most of the trucks that travel on Highway 273 are carrying too much freight and are overweight. The road needs to be repaved and are currently not made for the amount of truck traffic that travels the road.

Joe Lankford

119 Oak Trail

Mr. Lankford had concerns regarding the property in his neighborhood located on Ferstl and Belmont Mount Holly Road. He advised that the people in the neighborhood would like to get some type of idea what is going to be used for. It is rumored that all around the neighborhood that a halfway house is going into the existing structure on the property and the citizens in the area would like some answers.

Kevin Oliver

2505 Court Drive

Gastonia, NC

Mr. Oliver spoke regarding the property on Ferstl and Belmont Mount Holly Road. He advised that the property will not be used as a halfway house but more so as a location Veteran's can move into to get themselves back into the community or people with some type of mental illness.

Elena Frost

101 Cavin

Ms. Frost shared her concerns regarding the truck traffic on Highway 273 and the proposed halfway house.

OLD BUSINESS

1. Update on the Strategic Visioning Plan

Mr. Beal gave an update on the progress of the Strategic Visioning Plan. He advised that several aspects of the Strategic Visioning Plan have been met such as the greenway and the five concepts stated in the plan while others are still work in progress. Mr. Beal advised that he is constantly making contact with interested retailers and developers therefore meeting one of the overall goals of the plan in Economic Development. He advised that the RFQ submittals will be under staff review by the end of September and a recommendation will come before Council at the October Meeting for approval.

NEW BUSINESS

1. Discussion of Re-Routing Truck Traffic off of North Main Street

Mayor Hough advised that the City will not turn a blind eye to the problems reported on Highway 273 (North Main Street). Therefore Mr. Spangler with NCDOT was invited to come tonight and provide insight on the plans to repave North Main Street.

Mr. Spangler advised that NCDOT has plans to repave North Main from Nims to Lanier. The project is under contract to be completed no later than September 2016. The plans include 7 to 8 inches of milling and deeper in areas and complete resurfacing. He advised that a "C" mix will be put back which is a very sturdy mix. There was additional discussion regarding traffic counts and weight capacities. Mayor Hough advised that City Staff and Council will continue to look for ways to make improvements to the traffic and road conditions in that area. However, Freightliner has been very cooperative with the City, they employ over 2000 people and pay a huge amount of the tax base to the city. He advised that it is not all about money but we have to work on balancing it out. The city will start by contacting DMV and request more patrolling in the area and checking the truck weights. Then if future discussion is needed on this issue it can come back to Council at that time.

ADJOURN

With no additional items for discussion, Mayor Hough entertained a motion to adjourn. Councilman Gowen made the motion to adjourn the August 10, 2015 Council Meeting. Councilwoman Breyare seconded the motion. All Council members present voted in favor. (Motion carried)

Council:

I attended last November's council meeting where Councilman Hope stated from lessons learned, we are distrusting of developers promising things they won't deliver. The council tried three times to implement a strategy that would protect residential zones up N. Main from Heavy Industrial traffic: The Northern Mount Holly Loop, the road along the rail road shown on the Strategic Vision Plan, and the agreement to use Hwy 16 and rail for industrial traffic that was never made enforceable. So it's not a lack of strategy that is our problem today – but a lack of support from one or more government entities that has not implemented any of the three failed strategies that you defined. If our government were a developer, what would Councilman Hope tell them from lessons learned? Or if you councilpersons come over here and look at the six seats up there, would you wonder how that governing body isn't more effective?

I'm standing here wondering that exact question. Representing us people well is how we voters judge your performance. Tonight I've done work for you. For almost a year I've studied "what is possible" and "what the public wants". You know what I've found, not a single person wants a broken road. Not one member of the public told me they want Heavy Industrial freight trucks driving past their homes. And no citizen told me replacing N. Main with a 4-lane road is a good idea. Do you know what the most common response from citizens was on the issue? It was that council won't do anything for the people so why even try. Feel free to validate my findings; but if you really represent the people of Mount Holly in overseeing our government, you'll already know what I tell you. The question is: what will you do about it?

The strategy of allowing or not prohibiting truck traffic on N. Main will continue the blight problems that exist today. Left unchanged, we know where this will lead. The increase in traffic conflicts and congestion will pressure the NCDOT to improve N. Main into the 4-lane highway that was already requested by this council to the MPO. Once that process begins, it would be almost impossible to stop. And if you want to envision what that 4-lane highway would be to Mount Holly, one must only look as far as South Main to see how that will ruin a small town character and gateway entrance into the town.

North Main's lack of foundation does not have the capacity to support heavy truck traffic. It does not have the capacity to support more volume of traffic from the thriving Heavy Industrial zones. It is not appropriate to use North Main to carry heavy industrial freight – some of which could be hazardous and a mere 50 feet from the front doors of homes. We have to manage the road we have – not the road we wish we had. You have a council-adopted document that describes the will of the people that says we want to preserve our small town character and gateway entrances into town. We citizens are here to oversee you council -- similarly as you oversee the developers wanting to make changes to an agreed upon plan. Please plan and manage our growth by routing heavily loaded trucks via Hwy 16. It is a safety concern, a capacity concern, and uniquely in your domain (that nobody else but voters can advise you) it is a strategic vision concern of what we want for our town.

SET THE AGENDA

Mayor Hough advised that Council needs to amend the agenda and add item 6 Consideration and Approval of a Construction Manager at Risk for the Public Works Facility. Councilman Moore mad a motion to approve the agenda as amended. Councilwoman Moore seconded the motion. All Council Members present voted in favor.

1. Presentation of Granny's House Activities Center

Ms. Gloria Mack came before the City Council to request partnership with the City for her concept of Granny's House Activities Center. She advised that the concept is similar to a boys and girls club. By partnership she would like help finding a facility to house the Center. Mayor Hough suggested that Ms. Mack present her idea to the Recreation Commission and look into grant funding through the entities like the United Way.

2. Presentation of the 2016 Bike Race

Matthew Gregory came before the City Council to seek support of an amateur bike race series in spring or early summer of 2016. Partnering with the City could cut expenses related to security. He advised that the Recreation Commission is in support of this event. It was the consensus of the Council for Mr. Gregory to continue to work with the City Staff regarding this event.

3. Approval to re-submit for the 555 Fitness Grant

Chief Baker came before the Council for support to reapply for the 555 Fitness Grant. Councilman Toomey made the motion of support. Councilman Gowen seconded the motion. All Council Members present voted in favor. Motion carried.

4. Update on the Railroad Crossing Signalization

Mr. Michael advised that at a previous Council meeting this item was discussed and Council requested additional information. Mr. Michael explained that he wrote a letter to the NCDOT Rail Division and received information regarding the signalization process. If Mount Holly chooses not to participate this year a review is done a yearly basis and Mount Holly could come back around in a few years. Council agreed to continue to follow up on this process.

5. Review of Updates to the City Code

Ms. Anders presented the revisions to Chapter 21 of the City Code. Council discussed the revisions to section 21-14 regarding firearms. Ms. Anders advised that the changes made to the firearms ordinance were based upon recent state legislation. Council also had discussion in regard to section 21-20 regarding alcohol in the city parks. Council agreed they needed more clarification in those areas at the next meeting. Meanwhile, Councilman Moore made a motion to approve the proposed updates to Section 21 of the City Code with the exception of sections 21-14 and 21-20. (Resolution 082415a) Councilman Gowen seconded the motion. All Council Members voted in favor. (Motion carried)

6. Consideration and Approval of a Construction Manager at Risk for the Public Works Facility

Mr. Braswell advised that the Construction Committee and Staff met and is making a recommendation to approve a Construction Manager at Risk for the Adrian Plant. Councilman Gowen made the motion to approve the recommendation. Mayor Pro Tem Toomey seconded the motion. All Council Members present voted in favor. (Motion carried)

RE: Options for proposed revisions to Chapter 21 of the City Code regarding firearms and alcohol in Parks

DATE: September 10, 2015

At the August 24, 2015, Council meeting, I presented a proposed comprehensive update to Chapter 21 of the Mount Holly City Code which addressed typographical errors, modern policies of the Parks and Recreation Department, and recent state legislation. Council passed a resolution adopting the proposed revision as submitted with the exception of Section 21-14 entitled, "Firearms", and Section 21-20 entitled "Intoxicating liquors or beverages." Council gave direction to discuss more options regarding these two sections at the following meeting.

Before you know are options for Council to discuss regarding revising these two code sections. A short sketch of the options are as follows:

FIREARMS:

- A. Option A is the most restrictive option allowed by current NC law. It bans openly carrying firearms and also bans concealed carry with or without a permit and certain designated Recreational Areas. The State has removed the authority of the City to prohibit concealed carry with a permit in all areas of the park except certain areas described in the statute. At the last meeting, I presented this option and directly used the language from the statute. In this revised language, I have attempted to simplify and clarify the language, and it no longer directly mirrors the statute, but the statute was the starting place and guideline.
- B. Option A is the least restrictive option. It allows open carry of firearms and it allows concealed carry of firearms with a permit. However, firearms are not allowed in any municipal buildings per City Ordinance Sec. 14-23, therefore firearms could not be taken into the Tuckasee Community Center, the Old Gym, or any other buildings in the parks.
- C. Option A is a middle ground option where openly carrying firearms is allowed in the parks but concealed carry with or without a permit is prohibited to the fullest extent allowed by legislature. Firearms still cannot be carried into municipal buildings.
- D. Option B is another middle ground option where openly carrying firearms is prohibited by concealed carry with a permit is allowed. Firearms still cannot be carried into municipal buildings.

ALCOHOL:

- A. Option A is for the City to take no action to revise this code section. This section would continue to prohibit alcohol in parks entirely.
- B. Option B is where beer and wine is allowed in the parks with a special event permit subject to the terms and conditions listed in the ordinance. A special area is designated, similar to at downtown events, and alcohol is not permitted outside the confines of that special area.
- C. Option C is where beer and wine is allowed in the Tuckasee Community Center only with a special event permit subject to the terms and conditions listed in the ordinance. Alcohol is not permitted outside of the Tuckasee Community Center.

RESOLUTION TO AMEND SECTIONS OF
CHAPTER 21 OF THE MOUNT HOLLY CITY CODE
ENTITLED "PARKS AND RECREATION"

BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council hereby amends Chapter 21 entitled, "Parks and Recreation," of the Mount Holly City Code as follows:

FIREARMS:

OPTION A (The most restrictive option allowed by legislature).

Sec. 21-14 reads as re-written:

"Sec. 21-14. Firearms.

- (a) Openly carrying firearms or handguns. It shall be unlawful for any person to openly carry, possess, or display firearms of any description or air guns within any park. The Mount Holly Parks and Recreation Director or his designee is authorized and directed to post, in conspicuous locations, notices regarding this prohibition in the parks.
- (b) Possession or carry of concealed handguns. It shall be unlawful for any person to possess or carry a concealed handgun with or without a permit within any Recreational Areas as defined below. The Mount Holly Parks and Recreation Director or his designee is authorized and directed to post, in conspicuous locations, notices regarding this prohibition at or within the Recreational Areas located at: Tuckaseegee Park, Tuckaseegee Community Center, Veterans Park, River Street Park, Catawba Heights Neighborhood Park, Woodlawn Park, Mountain Island Park, and the Old Gym. Nevertheless, a concealed handgun permittee may, at a Recreational Area, secure the handgun in a locked vehicle within the trunk, glove box, or other enclosed compartment or area within or on the motor vehicle.
- (c) Definitions. For purposes of this section, the following terms are hereby defined:
 - (1) "Recreational Areas" includes only the following:
 - (i) A swimming pool, including any appurtenant facilities used for dressing, storage of personal items, or other uses relating to the swimming pool.
 - (ii) A facility used for athletic events, including, but not limited to, the skateboard park, basketball courts, and tennis courts.
 - (iii) An athletic field, including any appurtenant facilities such as stand-alone restrooms, but only during an athletic event, including practice sessions, which had been scheduled with the City of Mount Holly Parks and Recreation Department.

(2) Exclusions from Recreational Areas. For purposes of this section, the term “Recreational Areas” does not include any greenway, designated biking or walking path, an area that is customarily used as a walkway or bike path although not specifically designated for such use, open areas or fields where athletic events may occur unless the area qualifies as an “athletic field” as defined above or any other area that is not specifically described in subsections (i) through (iii) above.

(d) This section does not apply to a qualified sworn law enforcement officer or to a watchman or other person specifically authorized by the City of Mount Holly to carry firearms on such premises while acting lawfully and within the scope of his authority.

As to the prohibition of carrying firearms within municipal buildings, including buildings located within parks such as the Tuckasee Community Center, see § 14-23 of this Code.

OPTION B (Least restrictive option- open carry allowed, concealed carry with a permit allowed, except in buildings).

Sec. 21-14 reads as re-written:

| For state law regulating carrying concealed weapons, see G.S. § 14-269.

| As to the prohibition of carrying firearms within municipal buildings, including buildings located within parks such as the Tuckaseege Community Center, see § 14-23 of this Code."

OPTION C (Middle ground option. Open carry allowed, concealed carry prohibited to fullest extent permitted by legislature).

Sec. 21-14 reads as re-written:

"Sec. 21-14. Firearms.

(a) Possession or carry of concealed handguns. It shall be unlawful for any person to possess or carry a concealed handgun with or without a permit within any Recreational Areas as defined below. The Mount Holly Parks and Recreation Director or his designee is authorized and directed to post, in conspicuous locations, notices regarding this prohibition at or within the Recreational Areas located at: Tuckaseegee Park, Tuckaseegee Community Center, Veterans Park, River Street Park, Catawba Heights Neighborhood Park, Woodlawn Park, Mountain Island Park, and the Old Gym. Nevertheless, a concealed handgun permittee may, at a Recreational Area, secure the handgun in a locked vehicle within the trunk, glove box, or other enclosed compartment or area within or on the motor vehicle.

(b) Definitions. For purposes of this section, the following terms are hereby defined:

(1) "Recreational Areas" includes only the following:

ALCOHOL:

OPTION A- Council declines to make any change to Section 21-20 of the City Code. Alcohol will continue to be prohibited in the parks.

OPTION B- Beer and wine allowed in the parks pursuant to the terms of a special event permit.

Sec. 21-20 reads as re-written:

“Sec. 21-20. Intoxicating liquors or beverages.

It shall be unlawful for any person to consume or possess any alcoholic beverage, to be or become intoxicated, or to be under the influence of intoxicants within the confines of any park, except pursuant to a special event permit issued by the City Manager or his designee. If a special event applicant desires to have beer and/or wine consumption during an event, this information must be included in the special event application. This beer and wine permit, when issued, will be subject to all applicable ABC regulations and shall designate the boundaries of the event and temporarily close those portions of the park within the boundaries of the event from general public use. The applicant must provide to the City Manager or his designee a copy of the necessary ABC permit at least 24 hours prior to any weekday event, or by Noon on Thursday prior to a weekend event. No alcohol will be consumed in any park outside the designated boundaries of the event. All alcohol must be removed from the park within one hour of the conclusion of the event. All events serving or allowing beer and wine shall be required to employ one or more off-duty Mount Holly police officers. The cost of such security will be provided to the applicant at the time of making the application and shall be payable by applicant at the time the final rental payment is due. Disruptive behavior will not be tolerated and the City Manager, his designee, or the Mount Holly Police may close the event due to disruptive behavior and no refunds shall be paid.

~~No person shall sell or attempt to sell any beer, wine, whiskey or other intoxicating liquor or beverage within the confines of any park. No person shall be or become intoxicated, or under the influence of intoxicants, in public while within the confines of any park; public display or use of beer, wine, whiskey or other intoxicating liquor or beverage or the containers thereof is prohibited.”~~

OPTION C- Beer and wine allowed in the Tuckaseege Center pursuant to the terms of a special event permit.

Sec. 21-20 reads as re-written:

“Sec. 21-20. Intoxicating liquors or beverages.

It shall be unlawful for any person to consume or possess any alcoholic beverage, to be or become intoxicated, or to be under the influence of intoxicants within the confines of any park, except within the Tuckaseege Community Center pursuant to a special event permit issued by the City Manager or his designee. If a special event applicant desires to have beer and/or wine consumption during an event, this information must be included in the special event application. This beer and wine permit, when issued, will be subject to all applicable ABC regulations. The applicant must provide to the City Manager or his designee a copy of the necessary ABC permit at least 24 hours prior to any weekday event, or by Noon on Thursday prior to a weekend event. Monthly Report

Sole Patrol- The Sole Patrol met 21 days during the month of August. The total attendance was 835 with 69 different members attending. They met for a monthly birthday party, luncheons, and exercise.

Fitness Center- The Mount Holly Fitness Center was open 26 days during August. The total attendance was 211, with 39 different members attending. Of the 39, 22 were seniors, 9 were paying residents, and 8 were city employees.
